Our first Yew tree

We added yew to our list of approved tree species last year and the first yew tree was planted at our last treeplanting day in November.

Membership

By the end of 2017 the Association's membership had grown to 500 for burial



plus a further 145 members requesting burial of ashes and 69 for scattering of ashes. Of that total of 714 we have 267 members who have reserved burial rights for the future.

Burials in the past year



There were 25 burials during 2017 and 7 burials of ashes. We estimate that approximately 25% of the site's 10 acres has been used to date so, at the current usage, the

burial ground will have sufficient land to meet future needs for about a further 50 years.

Finance

The Association's finances remain healthy with reserves of around £70,000 which will enable the woodland to be well maintained once it is fully developed.

Site Maintenance



After 14 years the early plantings of our woodlands are reaching semi-maturity and we have begun to undertake some more rigorous pruning and clearance of unwanted vegetation.

Much recent work has involved clearing brambles and unwanted undergrowth to open up the space around specimen trees. This allows easier access and encourages wild flowers to colonise the ground.

Pruning and thinning trees

As the woodland develops it is essential to prune trees and remove any which show signs of disease or are likely to impede the growth of better specimens. The Association's Membership Rules include provision for lifting, pruning, coppicing and thinning, consistent with prudent management of a sustainable woodland area.

Some memorial trees may need to be sacrificed to ensure nearby trees can grow successfully. We understand that members will not want to lose trees planted as memorials to their loved ones and our aim is to not remove any memorial tree for at



least 10 years. We employ a professionally trained tree specialist to advise on best practice and, should he tell us that a memorial tree needs to be removed, we will endeavour

to contact the family's nominated representative and explain the need before proceeding. At this time, only trees in groves A and B, or the initial plantings, might be considered for thinning.

Members are reminded that trees, by their very nature, are not permanent memorials and we encourage all burials to be marked with a more durable memorial plaque.



Ash Dieback



Although not confirmed, we suspect that there are some initial signs of ash dieback among the early woodland plantings. Ash is not on our current list of approved species but about 20 have been planted as memorial trees over the years and these could be at risk. It is a fungal disease with spores active from June to October which cause necrotic lesions in the bark, crown dieback and leaf loss. We will continue to monitor the situation.

If we find that it is necessary to remove infected trees, we will replace them with alternative varieties.

Take a seat

The weather was fairly kind to us on our treeplanning day in November but the field shelter got rather crowded during the few showers. We didn't have enough chairs for weary souls so this splendid bench has been built along the back wall. Our thanks are due to Derek Wood for his excellent and speedy craftsmanship.



Tree Planting Day 2018

We plant our trees in the autumn because the young saplings have no risk of drying out before their roots become established. Friends and family of those buried during the preceding year are invited to join us and plant the tree they chose from our extensive list of approved varieties.

Attendance last year was the best ever with more than twenty cars at one point.
